updated DAR logo was ordered to replace it. We are awaiting installation.





Our National Society's goal is to place at least one marker in every state in advance – and in celebration – of the nation's upcoming 250th anniversary. There are no stipulations about where the plaques may be placed, indoors or out, e.g. parks, cemeteries, town squares, schools, municipal buildings, historic sites and private properties visible from a public street. Permission



MUST first be obtained from the site. We hope that these new markers will also become sources of pride for local communities to celebrate the brave Patriots who founded our nation – and a reminder of the

importance of emulating their conviction, courage and cooperation toward national unity. The markers are available either as a 30" by 30" post and cap mounted bronze plaque or a 24" by 24" bronze plaque for mounting on walls or stone. Where should Delaware place the marker in our state? Location ideas from each Delaware Chapter will be discussed at the State Meeting.

AMERICAN HISTORY

The purpose of the American History Committee is to promote American history. Although this has been somewhat of a challenge these last couple of years due to the Covid restrictions, it is this chairs hope that we will be able to once again rise and shine with the essay contests and recognizing women in American History.

In 2021, NSDAR established a new high school-level essay contest focused on figures of the American Revolution, in preparation for the 250th anniversary of the nation's founding. The contest is open to students in grades 9 through 12 in public, private, or parochial schools, or those who are home schooled. The student is asked to select a figure from the era of the American Revolution (1773-1783). Discuss how he or she influenced the course of the American Revolution.



The American History essay contest is for grades 5, 6, 7, and 8 students with the 2021-2022 title, "The Tomb of the

Unknown Soldier." The student is asked to write an essay imagining they had a brother who lost his life on the battlefields of France during World War 1. You and your family attended the November 11, 1921, dedication of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Washington, D.C. Describe what that meant to you and your family.



AMERICAN INDIAN



Wampum –
The Native
American
form of
diplomatic
credential
and currency
had its origins
among the
costal tribes
of the east. It
gained

widespread acceptance among tribe and with European traders as a measure of value and friendship. It was made from small seashells of varying colors that were laboriously ground and shaped to a spherical design, then bored out and strung on tiny cords of sinew. The color, patterns, and designs of the wampum bands had accepted common values. Although much is made of the cheating of Native Americans by the white settlers who traded beads for land, in fact the labor saved in using European glass beads to make wampum strings did give the beads much added value.

observed on 9 August each year to raise awareness and protect the rights of the world's indigenous population. This event also recognizes the achievements and contributions that indigenous people make to improve world issues such as environmental protection. It was first pronounced by the United Nations General Assembly in December 1994, marking the day of the first meeting of the UN Working Group on Indigenous Populations of the Sub-Commission on the Promotion and Protection of Human Rights in 1982.

Numbering at least 370-500 million, indigenous peoples represent the greater part of the world's cultural diversity, and have created and speak the major share of the world's almost 7000 languages.

Please continue to support the selected American Indian Schools we assist through the Daughters of the American Revolution, and discover how you might be able to help in other ways.



Lastly, this American Indian Committee Chair attended the 130th Continental Congress. Our Daughters shined with brilliance during the second year of the VanBuren Administration! Check out some of their wonderful accomplishments on the You Tube American Indians Luncheon which

HISTORIC PRESERVATION

There are many facets of this committee however this chair would just like to highlight one for this article, "DAR HISTORIC PRESERVATOIN GRANTS." 

HAVE YOU BEEN TO THE DAR MUSEUM?

Featured Object: Bottle Babies

Parenting advice books of the 18th and 19th century agreed that "the mother's milk, or that of a healthy nurse, is unquestionably the best food for an infant." Still, some mothers supplemented or substituted with "dry-nursing"—feeding with a milk and water mixture thickened with a little bread, and often combined with sugar, spices and wine. (Experts frowned on wine and spices, but some condoned sugar.)



A glass bottle fitted with a silver nipple and tube like this one, made or sold by Edward Rockwell in New York City in 1807, might be used to dry-nurse an

infant. The nipple would be covered with a bit of leather or cloth to protect the child's mouth.

The difficult-to-clean apparatus was a breeding ground for germs, which caused many infant illnesses and deaths. Long before knowledge of germs was widespread; it was well known that dry-nursed children survived less frequently than did wet-nursed ones.

Correspondent Docent Program

Mission Statement

DAR Museum Correspondent Docents are members who, under the direction of the Curator General, National Vice Chair, and museum staff, volunteer to promote the DAR Museum and its collections by providing public outreach through programs to DAR chapters, community organizations, and schools in an educated and professional manner.

Duties & Responsibilities

- Share DAR Museum history and collections with your local community by presenting DAR Museum approved Correspondent Docent programs
 - Download presentation and script outline from Correspondent Docent website: https://www.dar.org/museum/docent/dar-museum-correspondent-docents
 - o Familiarize yourself with the script and presentation; do not deviate from the script, other than to shorten it
- Identify and contact potential audiences to schedule presentations, such as local chapters, schools, retirement communities, and civic organizations
 - Communicate with the presentation site to confirm access to necessary equipment (ie. laptop, A/V cord, projector, and screen)
- Demonstrate excellence in content and audience engagement during presentations
- Report all programs by:
 - o Recording program information in the Volunteer Information Center within a month of presentation date
 - Sending the Correspondent Docent Annual Report Form (CG-3001) to your state correspondent docent vice chair (or state museum outreach chair if no state vice chair). The reporting deadline is set by each state.

Requirements

To become an active Correspondent Docent you must:

- Submit your application form (available at the Outreach Committee forms section of the Members' site on-line) and a check made out to Treasurer General, NSDAR for \$25 to your State Chair of DAR Museum Outreach. She will submit these to the NSDAR Museum, and will also send a copy of your application to the National Vice Chair for Correspondent Docents.
- 2. You will receive a welcome packet, training instructions, and password to the private Correspondent Docents' website. Register yourself at this site and complete the informative, 2- to 3-hour training session. You will now be a Correspondent Docent in Training (CDiT).
- 3. Present a total of 10 of the programs available on the Correspondent Docent site to chapters and community groups. Report each program at the site promptly after each presentation. There is a 5-year time limit for presentation of these programs. Only Museum-created programs available on the CD site count toward the 10 program credits.
- 4. After you have presented 10 programs, you become an active Correspondent Docent and are eligible to purchase the Museum Correspondent Docent pin.
- 5. If you attend Continental Congress, you can earn up to two program credits by serving at the DAR Museum Outreach table on committee evening or at the Museum Gift Shop Sales Table (contact your National Vice Chair to volunteer for either,) or by attending a DAR Museum workshop. Only one of these program credits can count toward the 10-program requirement to become an active Correspondent Docent.
- 6. There are charms which attach to the Correspondent Docent insignia pin for purchase for after presenting 25 and 50 programs.

To maintain your status as an active Correspondent Docent:

- Present at least two programs per three-year President General's administration.
- 2. Report all programs on the Volunteer information Center website and file the Correspondent Docent Annual Report (CG-3001) with your State Chair and National Vice Chair annually.
- 3. Stay up-to-date on DAR Museum happenings and program updates by checking the Correspondent Docent website frequently.
