In the scene, Alice sits on the bed (made of vintage wooden thread spools and bobbins), ready to don her symbolic white dress and the "Women's Votes" sash, and she will carry her much-used signage at a march in support of the now



stronger-than-ever National American Woman Suffrage Association. The day is nearing when women having the right to vote will become irrevocable law. On September 21st, the Cooch's Bridge Chapter held my first meeting as Regent! It was centered around the acquisition of the Cooch property by the State of Delaware. We also collected almost 240 individual snacks for USO Delaware. We also collected a myriad of baskets, honey sales, etc. and collected a tidy sum for my project. All this went on while our SAR speaker, Louis Raborg, gave a wonderful talk, "In the Beginning, There was Lady Liberty," a talk on the history of money beginning with colonial times.



We were pleased to have Gloria Lester, our State Regent, attend our January 18th meeting! In addition to our usual National Defense Report and Patriot Minute, we heard Christine Lashbook share her New Members project with us. It was a book report on

"Private Yankee Doodle." We also heard officer reports and some of our roughly 40 committee reports. Despite snow flurries, we finished with my talk, "Colonial Medicine," a fun project for me, indeed! The Cooch's Bridge Chapter held an outreach table on August 17th at the Old Tyme Peach Festival. We handed out postcards, displaying our website, and encouraged several prospective DAR members. We also enjoyed helping children make tissue paper peach blossoms accompanied with written instructions to promote literacy. By our participation in the festival, we also supported the Middletown Historical Society. We were delighted when our State Regent, Gloria Lester, visited and encouraged us!

We support events by the Pencader Heritage Museum. On September 7th, we participated in a Tribute to Soldiers who died in the Battle of Cooch's Bridge. We not only supplied 18 Betsy

Ross flags, but held a few of them high in honor of the regiments who fought. This battle helped delay the British so that the American Continental Army of General Washington could better prepare for the Battle of Brandywine. On



December 14th, we participated in the Wreaths Across America Ceremony as the first ever all female color guard at Pencader. On December 12th, our chapter was represented by Robin Hughes at the Wreaths Across America ceremony that took place at Glasgow High School.

We rolled up our sleeves on September 28th to clean gravestones in the historic section of the Head of the Christiana Cemetery, Newark, DE. Sixteen friends and family members, representing the DAR, CAR and SAR, used soft brushes and special cleaner to gently wash away dirt, lichens and anything else that damages gravestones. In a period of about three hours, we cleaned the gravestones of twenty-four patriots in the

historical cemetery. We also cleaned the gravestones of fourteen others in that section of the cemetery. Encouraged by the cemetery board, I am hoping to make this an annual event that enables us to help stabilize, or at least slow down, the deterioration of these historical gravestones. This has proved to be a wonderful community service project!

On November 7th, we hosted the recipients of new citizenship at the Naturalization Ceremony at the Court House in Wilmington! Every year, Debbie Cannon organizes our participation where we supply coffee and desserts to those who have just been given citizenship. We helped take their pictures, too. Their enthusiasm is contagious. They are excited to be able to vote and become members of the nation they obviously love. But I have observed the smiles on our DAR members that are reflective of their love and pride!

Our chapter again decorated a Storybook Christmas tree in the Historic Wilson House, preserved by the Historic Odessa Foundation. The tree was part of Christmas in Odessa, December 7th, and through the holiday season. The purpose of Christmas in Odessa is to fund college scholarships for local high school seniors. Our Storybook this year was The Steadfast Tin Soldier by Hans Christian Andersen. We welcome Elizabeth Cady Stanton: "Cyrano of the Suffragists"

Elizabeth Cady Stanton

(1815-1902) This show features: Women's Rights, Women's Suffrage, Equal Rights



This champion of the Women's Rights Movement stood out because Elizabeth Cady Stanton had several things many of the others lacked - a husband, seven children, tremendous writing ability, and a wicked sense of humor. What other suffragist had a husband and large family but still fought

for women's rights?

Stanton worked in close partnership with Susan B. Anthony - with Stanton writing Anthony's orations! While Stanton is best known for her long contribution to the woman suffrage struggle, she was also active and effective in winning property rights for married women, equal guardianship of children, and liberalized divorce laws so that women could leave abusive

marriages which harmed the wife, the children, and the economic health of the family.

Mary Ann Jung is an award-winning actress and Smithsonian scholar who performs fun, interactive, and inspiring shows about amazing women in history. She has appeared on CNN, the Today Show, Good Morning America and in newspapers around the world. We are fortunate to have Mary Ann perform an enactment in costume at our conference on Women's Suffrage.

Paving a Cow Path; Madonna of the Trail - Bethesda

Amidst the hustle and bustle, she stands guarding, ever vigilant near the corner of Wisconsin Avenue at Montgomery Avenue in downtown Bethesda, Maryland. Bethesda, a Washington, D.C. suburb which was once a sleepy village almost a century ago, is now a thriving vibrant metropolis in its own right, complete with multiplexes of high-rise apartments and office buildings which seem to swallow up the surrounding landscape. In an ironic juxtaposition of past and present, she stands facing east toward the horizon, across 6 lanes of traffic, clutching a musket and her children as if protecting them from some unseen threat amidst the glass buildings, asphalt and concrete.

Dedicated in 1929 by then Judge Harry S. Truman before a crowd of over 5,000 people, her position was prominent at the corner of Montgomery Lane and Wisconsin Avenue, across from the then-County Building. She now watches over the Hyatt Regency parking garage.



Bethesda Madonna- Little Known Facts

- She is the ONLY Historic Monument in Bethesda
- She is the only Madonna statue facing east when the entire point is to honor the courage and spirit of pioneer women as they headed WEST into the wilderness.
- Her location marked the approximate location of the encampment out of Georgetown where pioneers prepared to head onto the Cumberland Trail on their way to the Santa Fe Trail.
- In 1982, she was removed to protect her during the construction of the Metro Red Line which is now below her.
- In December 2004, due to a sinkhole from a water main break, the statue tilted on its foundation, so it was again stored offsite. It was reinstalled in the same location after the ground was stabilized.



Come spend the day with NSDAR, SAR, and CAR members as we celebrate the Delaware State Service at the Washington Memorial Chapel. Nestled within the beautiful Valley Forge National Historic Park (and only minutes away from the King of Prussia Mall, the premiere

shopping destination on the East Coast), lies a historic chapel built as a tribute to the winter encampment of General George Washington and the Continental Army.



Construction of the Chapel began in 1903 with funds raised by the NSDAR and the SAR. Immense stained-glass windows and intricate woodcarvings illustrate Washington's role in the revolutionary struggle for freedom. The National Patriots' Bell Tower and Carillon, a gift from the NSDAR, was dedicated in April, 1953, and houses one of the world's largest carillons.

This year's schedule of events includes: a CAR wreath laying at 11:00, the Delaware State Service at 11:45, and a luncheon immediately after the ceremony; we hope to see you there! Report from DAR Education and Leadership Training State Coordinators:

Barbara Seningen (New Horizons) and Cathy Hudson (Members Course):

Chapter and State Member Training Challenge

Rise to the challenge! In order to promote training, the VanBuren Administration has set chapter and state goals for course graduates, with the three-year administration goal being based on the January 2020 membership count. Percentage is based on graduates from the inception of the Member Training Courses in January, 2016. Those members who completed the New Members Course (2016-2019) will be counted toward the tally for the Members Course.

Beam with brilliance as your chapter and state rise to meet the challenge to promote leadership training at all levels. Awards will be given at Continental Congress or presented during the President General's visit, if achieved prior to her visit.

Chapter Member Training Awards

- **25%** or more of a chapter's members graduated from the Members Course
- 100% of a chapter's executive board graduated from the Members Course AND the Chapter Regent and at least one other board member graduated from the New Horizons Course

State Member Training Awards

- More than 15% of a state's total membership graduated from the Members Course
- **100%** of the State Executive Board graduated from the New Horizons Course

If this information looks familiar, it is because it was taken from the Leadership Training committee on the DAR.org website.

Your State Leadership Training Coordinators would like to take this opportunity to offer two plans for your consideration.

Plan A (Fast Track)

Complete the Members course by June 2020 and then begin the New Horizons Course immediately, and complete by December 2020.

Plan B (Relaxed)

Take a more relaxed approach and begin or continue the Members Course within a year and then start the New Horizons Course and plan to finish within the following year.

Advantages to Plan A: Some of us tend to thrive under a little more pressure. Both courses must be completed by December 2020 to allow time for everything to be processed at the National and State levels. You will be presented your Graduation Cord and Certificate at the 2021 State Conference by our President General Denise Doring VanBuren. Not to mention you will have all the DAR knowledge and the courses completed.

Advantages to Plan B: If you are the type of lady that does not work well under a little pressure this could be the plan for you! This is a less stressful learning experience and you will still complete during this term. You will also be recognized at the 2021 State Conference as currently taking one of these courses. However, you must finish by Spring 2022 in order to count in this term's training challenge.

Please remember, you must take the Members Course first followed by the New

Horizons Course. Your Coordinators are here to assist you with a pleasant and positive experience regarding our great Society.

In order to improve, we need feedback. Please let us know what we can do to improve the experience of taking these valuable training courses.

In early November 2019, it was discovered that WAA could be a fundraiser for the State Society. By the time the registration was accepted and we began to promote it, there were only 3 weeks to make it work. A modest goal of 50 wreaths was set. According to the report on December 17, 2019, we not only met the goal of 50 wreaths but bypassed it for a total of **61**!!! Accordingly, the State should receive \$305 this Spring. The first check for \$245 has been received.

Why is this important? Funds are necessary at all levels (Chapter, State and National) to help further our mission of the DAR.

The NSDAR tries to keep dues as reasonable as possible in order to encourage membership. Within NSDAR, over 60 committees and projects need support in order to be effective. From the President General's Project, State Regents' Projects, and national committee projects down to local committee work, all require more funding than dues currently meet. Fundraising at all levels can supply these needed funds while:

encouraging new membership and other volunteers,

- providing education about the NSDAR and its programs,
- creating public awareness of the chapter, the good that it does, and the needs that it meets in the community,
- as well as providing fun and social time for the members themselves.

What is VAVS? VAVS is the acronym for the VA Voluntary Service. "Volunteers are a priceless asset to the Nation's Veterans and the Department of Veterans Affairs." In general, volunteers perform a large number of daily tasks that help the VA to run smoothly, connects citizen volunteers with veterans and lets individuals and companies donate to one of the worthiest causes possible – helping those who served our great country.

Volunteer Impact

In Fiscal Year 2019, over 61,000 Volunteers served more than 9.2 Million Volunteer Hours. Individuals and partnering organizations gave over \$99 Million in Gifts and Donations. Savings to VA - more than \$332 Million!

Who goes to the volunteer meetings? At the most recent VAVS meeting at the Elsmere VA center there were Service Organization reps from all over Delaware including The Elks, Daughters

of 1812, Knights of Columbus, Marine Corp League, American Legion and a rep from DuPont,

the latest corporation to partner with the Hospital (yee-haw for the VA!) Another major corporate partner is Gordon Foods. Last year, Gordon hosted an all-expenses paid picnic for Vets and Employees at the VA (850 ppl!) during 9-11 Patriot Day Celebration.

What went on at the January meeting? This meeting was an overview of last year – what worked and what did not for the department. A social worker told inspiring stories of how the money and goods donated helped a wide variety of vets and their families – from Holiday time to medical visits. Not only do medical procedures get paid for, but travel to the VA, a hotel room and money for dinner, etc., can be part of the help received. The Angel Tree Program and Thanksgiving Grocery Card donations are so popular that thousands of people receive this help over the holidays in our state.

The DAR is involved in many worthwhile endeavors, this is certainly one of them! The *needs bags* our chapter made in October were taken to this Volunteer office – and they were greatly appreciated. Every three years new representatives are assigned by the State Regent. Clare Vosteen of Cooch's Bridge and I are the reps currently serving.

2020 Helen Pouch Memorial Fund Classroom Grant Program

There are two grants of \$500 each for two classrooms in each state and the District of Columbia (totaling \$51,000). Classroom teachers for grades Kindergarten through 12th grade are eligible to apply.

The deadline for applying is April 1, 2020.

Please contact Beth Beachell, State Junior Membership Chair for details and the application. Made possible through the DAR national Junior Membership Committee and the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund.

Junior Membership Classroom Grant Timeline

- February Applications sent to State Junior Membership Chairs to then forward to chapters.
- February 15 through April 1 Application process open to classroom teachers.
- May 15 Deadline for submitting the state winner and runner-up to the National Junior Membership Chair.
- June Grant winners announce at Congress.
- No later than August 31 Awards mailed to teacher.
- December 31 Report of project sent the National Vice Chair or upon project completion of the project.

Common Questions About the Junior Membership Classroom Grants:

How will this program impact our commitment to the DAR Schools?

It won't! The Junior Membership committee and Helen Pouch Memorial Fund have an annual commitment to the DAR Schools. Priority for fundraising will always be given to the DAR Schools.

How will this program impact the National Junior Committee Project?

It won't! After our commitment to the DAR Schools, the Junior Membership Committee will fulfill our obligation to the adopted National Project for that year prior to accepting grant award applications.

The annual grant award amount will be approved by the Executive Committee in February after reviewing the total amount available for disbursement for the Helen Pouch Memorial Fund from contributions and fundraising for the prior year.

Should we do anything to recognize our grant award winner?

Of course! Consider making a ceremonial check presentation to the winner at your state's fall meeting or holding a special ceremony at the recipient's classroom or at a meeting of the sponsoring DAR chapter. You could also recognize your winner during your State Conference in the spring and allow the teacher to speak about the impact the grant has had on his/her classroom. Write an article about the project for your state's newsletters. Submit details to the National Junior Membership newsletter.

Who is considered a classroom teacher?

A classroom teacher is a teacher in a public or private school system. They can teach a core subject or other group setting classes in grades K-12. Individual programs like speech or occupational therapy are not eligible. The teacher must hold a contract for the following school year and can have the application endorsed by a principal, headmaster, or superintendent to verify employment. Home school teachers are not considered classroom teachers. The goal of the classroom grant program is to do the greatest good for the great number of students.

Can a non-regular education teacher apply if they meet the definition of a classroom teacher?

Special education services vary from state to state and that is why it needs to be clear that the teacher is teaching a classroom of students and not providing pull out service. An example of a classroom would be: A reading class is being taught to a group of students by the special education teacher.

Pull out service would be a special education teacher working with students on reading for a class that is being taught by another teacher.

Can a classroom grant be used by the school lunch program?

No, grant funds must be used for education setting activities in a classroom.

Can a classroom grant be used by a classroom teacher to invite a guest expert performer/lecturer to come and teach classes in a classroom as a way to extending the learning experience of students?

Yes, this fits the definition of the focus on student learning of the grant program. This activity has a direct benefit to the students' learning.

Can a classroom grant be used by a classroom teacher to take students on an out of school field trip to cover the cost of entry of students to a learning venue?

Yes, this is an activity that is focused on education to help expand the classroom learning experience. This activity has a direct benefit to the students' learning.

Can a DAR member apply for a grant?

Yes! DAR members who meet the eligibility requirements of classroom teachers may apply for the grant. They should not list their DAR membership as part of their application, as no preference should be given to DAR members when reviewing the applications, and grants should be awarded based on the merits of the application alone.

Why can't my chapter endorse more than one applicant?

Two grants are available per state. Some states have hundreds of chapters. Each application is reviewed by a panel of volunteer judges. Limits must be placed to ensure these judges aren't overwhelmed with applications. Also, the goal of this grant program is to impact as many children in as many communities as possible.
